## FLU CLOSES TOPEKA HIGH AGAIN

"Hurrah! Unexpected vacation. 'Flu' closes school for three weeks. Joy registered around THS until a new plan of studying thru vacation is announced. GLOOM!"

Sound like a description of Topeka High students' reaction to the 2020 coronavirus pandemic?

No, it's an excerpt from the 1918-19 Topeka High Sunflower yearbook. A "Calendar for 1918-19" in that yearbook detailed student observations about what happened throughout a school year marked by the Spanish Flu pandemic, starting with that first entry on Oct. 5, 1918.

THS journalism adviser Heather Hooper found the calendar page in an electronic archive of THS Sunflower yearbooks.

"I loved the fact that the item started with 'Hurrah! Unexpected vacation announced.' Sounds just like students today, followed by the 'gloom' of continuing education," Hooper said.

"Teenagers haven't changed that much in 100 years, but I will say as a teacher of teenagers in 2020, there wasn't much excitement when the county health department extended our spring break for two weeks on Friday, March 13 (due to coronavirus). I did not hear elation from our students. They were still stung by the abrupt cancellation of the state basketball tournament, which we believed our undefeated girls team had every chance of winning. This time there was so much uncertainty and confusion about the changes that were quickly taking place."

School buildings ultimately closed through the remainder of the school year, while teachers worked to remotely provide instruction to their students.

"Students are sad, especially the seniors who don't know how or when they will mark their graduations. No prom, no spring sports. Mostly, the students are sad about not being able to see each other," Hooper said. "But in the midst of all of this, I've also seen amazing,

resourcefulness and resilience from our current yearbook staff, led by senior Editor in Chief Kaitlyn Brown."

The shutdown in March happened just one week before the yearbook's final press deadline.

"We had planned to use that week back from spring break to wrap up all loose ends and complete a doublepage spread on the girls basketball tournament (win)," Hooper said. "They scrambled to interview students via social media, and five students met me at the picnic tables at school - each at a different table - so I could get them cameras and laptops so they could finish the work they started.

"They sat outside the school to connect to our server and downloaded photo files like the house was on fire. They would also return, alone, to empty school buildings around the city, whatever was closest to home, to connect to the school's network to access our photo files for anything they missed. They worked heroically under really difficult conditions and finished our yearbook - on time!

"We had photos from the first state basketball tournament and got comments from players and fans about the aftermath. We included the Covid-19 closures and we interviewed kids about life on lockdown. This book will be one for the ages, too," Hooper said, adding, "And we're not done. In the next few weeks, the yearbook staff wants to put together a 12-page supplement that follows students during our final quarter. So, the work goes on."

What next?

"We don't know how or when we will distribute our 2020 yearbook. The day we turned it into the Balfour plant in Dallas, we got a message saying the plant was being forced to close for a couple of weeks. We know we'll get it eventually; hopefully by early summer we can have a day to celebrate together - or have a drivethru distribution - but either way, the history of Topeka High is still being told."

Nov. 4, 1918: School board holds meeting and decides to lengthen school day 30 minutes and to have but one week Christmas vacation. More Happiness!

Nov. 7, 1918: School re-opens with new schedule. Alarm clocks work overtime abut 8 a.m. School smells like hospital and gloom is thicker than disinfectants.

Nov. 14, 1918: World staff puts on farce in assembly to introduce long-delayed issue of The World. After dark weeks Journalism class comes out victorious and puts out good paper.

Jan. 1, 1919: School on New Year's Day. General resolution seems to be "Resolved, never to look happy again." Amount of work made up during the day is amazing.

Jan. 15, 1919: Class of 1919 reaches the climax of their misfortunes. School board vetoes graduation exercises. Some people have all the luck!

Jan. 30, 1919: Bad luck day for the faculty: many ill.

### Topeka High Chiefs fan wins Super Prize



Patrick Donnelly 1959 is a double winner. A 50-year Kansas City Chiefs season ticket holder won a lottery for season ticket holders that awarded him an all-expenses paid trip to the Super Bowl. He also experienced firsthand the excitement of winning the biggest game in football.

With the package, Donnelly won a flight on a chartered jet with people associated with the Chiefs, three nights lodging in Miami, tickets in the second deck at about the 48-yeard line, and entrance to numerous events surrounding the game.

A retired engineer for the Kansas Department of Transportation began attending Chiefs games in the 1960s, and purchased his first set of season tickets in 1969, the first time that the Chiefs won a Super Bowl.

A friend from Kansas City who has been sitting next to Donnelly at the games for 50 years accompanied him to the game.

Donnelly had a feeling, before the game, that the Chiefs were going to win. He had watched a lot of Chiefs football to make that accurate prediction.

### LADY TROJANS 2020


After qualifying for the 6A state semifinals, the Lady Trojans' basketball season came to an unexpected end. With a second-place finish last season, the team was going into the 2019-2020 season looking for redemption before being stricken from that opportunity. However, their season still holds many notable accomplishments.

First, the Lady Trojans went 23-0, winning the Centennial League championship and defeating their opponents by an average of 38 points. Secondly, many players, along with head coach Hannah Alexander, received several points of recognition.

NiJaree Canady, sophomore, made first-team All-City for her second season and was named the Centennial League player of the year, averaging a double-double season for her second straight season. Kiki Smith, freshman, was also named a first-team All-City and All-Centennial League pick as well as newcomer of the year for both the city and the league. And after leading her team to a semifinal berth and an undefeated season, Coach Alexander was named the All-City coach of the year.

Other notable Lady Trojans include Lilly Smith, junior, who made second-team All-City, Ja'Neysha Hendricks, junior, who made third-team All-City, and Yana Grassity, senior, who made the Honorable Mention list.

Despite all the success, their season didn't end the way they had hoped and so the team is eagerly looking forward to next year when they can return to Wichita and have another shot at the state title. "I think we definitely know what we're capable of," said Alexander. "We know that we can get back to that state tournament. We've just got to keep doing what we did this season and we have to continue to bring it each and every day."
