## 2023 Ed Love Scholarship awarded to three THS seniors

The THSHS Ed Love Scholarship was established in 1994 in memory of Ed Love (1939), a founder of the THS Historical Society. Fifty-one students have received the scholarship in the past twenty-nine years. Three outstanding seniors, in their class of 330 students, received a \$1,000 scholarship award at the THSHS board of directors' meeting that was held in the THS Woodward Library on April 17th.

Adisyn Caryl has been president of her class, on the Superintendent's and Principal's Student Advisory Councils,



American Field Service, and Spirit Club all four years at THS. She earned honors and championships in tennis, basketball, and softball. She played second base on the THS 6A 2021 Softball Undefeated State Champion Team and the THS 2022 Softball State Champion Team. Her college objective is to earn a Bachelor's degree in Spanish and Elementary Education and minor in Social Service. She will be attending the University of Illinois on a softball scholarship.

**Kushal Mamillapalli** is a 2023 National Merit Finalist. He plans to become a computer scientist with a minor in ro-



botics. He has qualified for State in Policy Debate for three years and nationals in World Schools Debate. Kushal played the clarinet in the Trojan Band and participated successfully in Scholars Bowl and tennis. In the summer of 2022 he taught Ugandan students mathematics through zoom to supplement their school curriculum. In his free time, Kushal works on his coding skills in Java and

Python.

After graduating from Washburn in 1956, Chuck joined the U.S. Air Force and while not flying jet fighters, he continued playing volleyball on the Air Force and Armed Forces All-American first team in 1958 and 1959. Chuck retired from competitive volleyball fol-

lowing the 1964 Tokyo Summer Olympics which featured the first-ever volleyball competition. In 1968, he started the Pepperdine University volleyball program and from 1975 to 1977 he served as the commissioner and CEO of the International Volleyball Association. He also worked for the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics. Nelson, who has lived in Santa Monica, CA for more than four decades, has taken part in a program called "Ready, Set, Go", an effort of Olympic alumni in Southern California where each member is assigned a particular school in the L.A. district, meeting with and motivating the kids five times a

year. While he has traded his volleyball for a tennis ball now, he continues to promote the benefits of staying physically fit.



### **More Graduates in the Spotlight**

A story about my friend **Denise Hartman of Council Grove**, formerly **Denise Taylor**, **THS 1983**.

In Denise's sophomore year at Troy she arrived one morning and was leaving the 1st floor foyer and was about on the 3rd step going up to 2nd floor when another girl grabbed her by the collar, dragged her back down into the hall and pinned her to the windows of the main office. The other girl was much larger and was about to "deliver a vigorous thrashing." Denise

Taylor was completely overpowered and helpless. She was rescued by the THS security officer that the students called "Opie" known to others as **Mike Homan** who worked at T-High 1978-2013. The other girl had a reputation for being a bully and was widely known as "The Dragon Lady." The Dragon Lady was suspended and when leaving school at the end of the day Denise found that the tires of her car were slashed. As she watched her car being towed away she vowed that she would never be a physically helpless victim again.

She began taking kickboxing lessons and later karate & other martial arts. Her trainer saw potential and called other gyms, eventually setting up some successful and popular exhibition matches. At that time there was no such thing, anywhere, as "Women's League Kickboxing."

Eventually, with time and hard work she actually became a professional kickboxer. She battled Darling Valdez (both girls were world contenders) for the US Championship in the first Women's Kickboxing match to appear on ESPN. She won that match to become the United States Women's Bantamweight Champion Kickboxer in 1989 & ranked #2 in the world with a record of 9 & 3. She went to France and fought a 12 round match for the world championship and lost in a 2 to 1 decision.

Denise never forgot the girl who attacked her but decided with time and maturity that revenge was never a worthy goal. Ironically the Dragon Lady changed Denise's life in a positive way and she concludes that NOBODY should accept being a victim.

Jolene Bluejacket Worthington, THS 1959, retired five years ago after a long association with Eli's Cheesecake. The bakery, which delivers worldwide, was a slice off Eli's Place for Steaks, a white tablecloth restaurant in Chicago. Eli Schulman wanted a signature dessert for his top restaurant. He

perfected the Chicago style cheesecake, which has a butter/shortbread crust and is baked dry – not in a water bath – to give it a golden exterior and creamy interior.

Jolene joined Eli's son, Marc Schulman, in 1984 at the opening of Eli's Finest Cheesecakes, dedicated just to their amazing dessert. As vice president of operations, she helped build and shape the staff during her 35 years with the company. For its workers, Eli's went beyond simple employment, helping adults finish their high school education with onsite classes while being employed.

In her spare time, Jolene mentored culinary students at the

In her spare time, Jolene mentored culinary students at the Chicago High School for Agricultural Sciences. She also has served on the boards of Slow Foods, and the Cooking and Hospitality Institute of Chicago, and has been a long-standing member of Les Dames de Escoffier, a national organization of women food professionals.

Before joining Eli's, Jolene was a food stylist and consultant for Time-Life Books and a freelance writer for Cuisine magazine. She also had a cooking column in the Chicago Tribune after she started at Eli's.

She may have learned something about cooking as a member of Future Homemakers of America at Topeka High, but the Science Club had more to offer in mastering how ingredients go together.

Jolene also was in Pep Club, the Junior Red Cross Club and the Modern Dance Club. She worked as a proctor and helped plan prom.

Before heading for the big city, Jolene operated Alpha Books at White Lakes Mall in Topeka and Omega Books downtown.

"Jolene was instrumental in taking Eli's Cheesecake from the signature dessert at Eli's the Place for Steak in Chicago to being one of the largest specialty cheesecake and dessert companies in the country," Marc Schulman, president of Eli's, said.
